

'Mapping the fractured reality of Jerusalem'

Mapping Jerusalem through time reveals the gradual transformation of its borders, and the progressive appropriation of the eastern Palestinian parts of the city by Israel.

Urban fabric, agricultural land, holy sites, water resources, views, runways, and even airspace are all absorbed by the city's expanding network.

Archaeological digs slice through time to link Jewish biblical history with modern Israel. A system of bypass roads and tunnels links the occupied West Bank with Israel via Jerusalem.

A complex system of separation and surveillance – wall, towers, and checkpoints – supposedly unifies a greater Jewish Jerusalem, but in reality slices the city into Israeli and Palestinian enclaves.
